A Year Without "Made in China"

Sara Bongiorno, author of *A Year Without "Made in China: One Family's True Life Adventures in the Global Economy"*, will be at the Greenwell Springs Road Regional Branch, on Saturday, January 19, at 2:00 p.m. A book signing and light reception will follow Bongiorno's talk about her book and her work as a business journalist.

A Year Without "Made in China" follows Bongiorno's own experience as her family decides to forgo anything made in China for an entire year. What starts out as a test to see if it is possible to avoid all products manufactured in or exported from China evolves into something more. The mother of three denies that she was trying to make a political statement. Instead, she states, "It was a way to try to understand in a very real and personal way my own family's connections to this big fuzzy concept of the global economy, and specifically to China," said Bongiorno.

This experiment started soon after Christmas 2004 as she sorted through gifts and wrapping paper. Looking around the heap of goods, she realized almost all of it came from China. "I thought, you know, it would be fun just to see if we could go a whole year ... without China," recalls Bongiorno. "It certainly took over our whole life. It became an all-consuming project."

Bongiorno is an award-winning journalist who resides locally with her family.

Library Receives Endowment

Sara Weill Kantrow always had a love of reading. When her eye sight began to fail due to macular degeneration, Kantrow turned to audio books. "She would have someone drive her to the Main Library and she would check out as many audio books as she was allowed," says Kantrow's son Byron Kantrow, Jr. Once home, she would listen to them for hours. "She always had them playing," remembers son Lee Kantrow. "She consumed them."

Library staff would often assist Mrs. Kantrow and kept track of authors she liked. "We kept a list of the audio books she had checked out and would find new ones for her each week," recalls library technician, Kitty Brothers. "She probably listened to the majority of our fiction collection."

After she passed away in March 2006, the Kantrow sons and their wives decided the most fitting tribute to their mother would be to set up an endowment in her honor for the Library's audio book collection. "The audio books were the best thing for her," says Byron Kantrow, Jr. "They always kept her occupied and she truly enjoyed them."

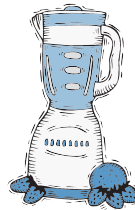

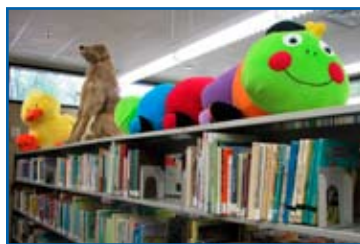

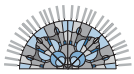
